Master Curved Piecing with the Many Moons Quilt Pattern

Adding curves to a quilt has never been easier. We will cover three different ways to piece curves so you can try them all and find your favorite way. We will also explore how color, contrast, and fabrics change the look of these quilts.

Materials:

- Pattern: Many Moons, Broken Moons uses the same techniques and also works for this class
- Fabric: Avoid low thread count fabrics as they fall apart when cut on the bias. Refer to the pattern for yardage
- Coordinating thread
- Batting, backing, and binding are not needed for the class but will be needed to finish the quilt, refer to the pattern for yardages.

Tools & Equipment:

- Elmer's School Glue
- Glue pen or glue stick
- Pins
- Rotary cutter
- 8" quilting ruler (or larger)
- Cutting mat
- Sewing machine with a quarter inch foot or standard foot - possibly provided by host
- Iron - provided by host
- Ironing mat or board - provided by host
- Seam ripper
- Circle Savvy Ruler, optional
- Curve Master Presser Foot, optional

Available Supplies:

The patterns and the following supplies will be available for purchase during class.

- Sewline's Glue Pen
- Circle Savvy Ruler by Creative Grids
- Martelli's Curve Master Presser Foot
- Rotary Cutter by Martelli, right and left handed options

Before class:

- Starch fabrics well. Curves require working with bias. Starching fabric before cutting it is important for reducing distortion.
- Many Moons: From each background fabric cut four 15½" squares (10½" squares for the smaller finished sized quilt). Cut each square in half diagonally to create 8 large triangles.
- Broken Moons: From the fabric used for the putty color cut eight 15½" squares (10½" squares for the smaller finished sized quilt). Cut each square in half diagonally to create 16 large triangles.
